

Director's Report

Visitors to the Community Memorial Museum will sometimes walk into the building and start their visit with a query to the volunteer at the front desk, "You don't have much history here, do you?" A variety of answers follow disclaiming the notion that our piece of the earth isn't quite as old as the rest of the world, but the basic premise that this combination statement/question raises needs to be addressed.

Visitors to Washington, D.C. and Philadelphia see lots of evidence of history. There are large old buildings and elaborate granite monuments to mark places of "historical interest". We become so dazzled by these high-tech reminders of history that by the time we get to a small county like Sutter, if there isn't a large sign proclaiming that something important happened here one hundred years ago, then what's the use of seeing the place at all?

Sutter County has just as much "history" as anywhere else on earth. There is a natural history that is intrinsic to the entire planet that we share. The history of the people who dwelled here is, however, a far more subtle thing. There are no plaques up to proclaim Maidu Indians once lived here, but they did. And there are no signs that spell out in neon how the early white settlers came to this area and made it their home, but that happened too. Subtle points of history, perhaps, but as important to you and me as the signing of the Declaration of Independence and, in many ways, more relevant.

The Community Memorial Museum is the community's storyteller and in many ways that makes it a museum of subtle history. History that helps us to understand how our county was established and why it functions the way it does. History about families that are intrinsic to the basic fiber of the County. History about newcomers who made their mark as well. Every exhibit that goes up in the Museum deals with a subtle point of Sutter County history, be it the Sutter Buttes (some would argue that they are hardly subtle) or the cooking and eating habits of the last century. All that we can hope for is that every time an exhibit goes up, the story it tells loses its subtleness and becomes more blatantly obvious. Then next time someone asks "You don't have much history here, do you?" we can smugly answer "Yup, we've got lots of history here", and can show them.

Special Report

The Yuba City Rotary Club has made the Museum their Spring Community Service Project. Some Club members noticed our odd assortment of metal storage sheds behind the Museum and surmised that we could use a more permanent form of storage. So, in April, the Rotary Club will construct a 20' x 24' artifact storage building for the Museum.

As the Museum continues to collect the history of Sutter County, our storage needs will continue to grow. The Yuba City Rotary Club's recognition of this problem and their generous response to it is a special gift to everyone in the county. On behalf of the Museum staff and Commission and the Sutter County Board of Supervisors, "Thank you, Yuba City Rotary!"


